Audio Letters as 'Sonic Memory Objects' in Migration Processes

Since the invention of the phonograph at the end of the 19th century, it has been possible to send spoken letters over long distances. While the early audio letters were often sent by travellers from the middle class, the later formats were also used by people in precarious migration contexts. This workshop aims to analyse how voice letters have been a vehicle for staying in touch over long distances, especially in times of migration and flight and how these objects created sonic memories of the absent world as they carried their acoustic tracks over distances and time. Furthermore, we want to examine how voice recordings were used by colonial anthropologists and modern border regimes. As we conceptualise them as 'memory objects' we want to discuss the entanglement of materiality and processes of substituting for the missing as well as processes of longing and of remembering.
